KIDS MATTER—Teaching children values

Values are the internal guides we have for our behaviour. They help us to make choices, and to make judgements about what is right and wrong, good or bad, fair or unfair.

How parents and carers can help:

Parents and carers can use a range of strategies to help children learn about social values.

- Teach by example. Children often learn more from what you do than what you say.
- *Read and discuss stories that demonstrate positive values.* Choose children's stories that reflect the kinds of values you want children to learn. You might ask questions like: How do you think that person feels? Why do you think he/she did that? Was it a good idea? How could he/she have done it better?
- Check what children are watching on TV. Make sure the programs children watch and the electronic games they play are suitable for their age and reflect positive values.
- *Teach children to learn from mistakes.* Mistakes provide opportunities for teaching and reinforcing positive values. Support and acknowledge children when they admit mistakes and help them find ways to make up for them.

• *Help children to think about values.* Talk with them about the social values and attitudes they encounter in everyday situations and on TV. Teaching children about values supports their social development. It helps them develop the knowledge and skills they need to play a positive role in society.

Electric Shock Incursion

On Wednesday 29 November, Years 4-6 went to an incursion about what to do if you or someone else gets bitten by a snake or receives an electric shock. A lady named Megan came from the St John Ambulance Centre to talk to us about it.

First she talked about the DRSABCD which stands for Danger, Response, Send for Help, Airway, Breathing, CPR and Defibrillation. After that Megan showed us her trainers' defibrillator and also where to put the pads and how to use the defibrillator. One of the pieces of information was that you should put the kid pads on children who are four to ten years old [unless a ten year old is very tall] and the adult pads on over ten years to adults. Pads are never used on children under four as it could damage their hearts.



Megan then showed us what to do if someone gets an electric shock. If you do receive an one from something you are holding, your muscles will tighten causing the shock to last longer. To prevent getting electrocuted you need to turn off the main power box or find a long wooden pole that has no plastic on it and use this to turn off the power switch.

If a broken live wire is in a puddle of water and a friend steps in it you need to turn of the electrical box and remove the broken wire from the puddle using something wooden with no plastic on it and don't use a pencil as it contains graphite which is a conductor of electricity. When removing the power cable make sure not to step in the puddle.

Snakebite Incursion

Megan also talked about dealing with a snake bite. The first thing to remember is to stay calm if you or someone gets bitten. Megan demonstrated on one of our classmates about the types of snake bites that you can get and how you can't identify if the snake was venomous or not. The different types of snake bites you can get are the one hole bites, scratch bites and the bites where it is clear where the bite is and how deep it is.

If you or someone else gets bitten on the arm by a snake you should get a smooth piece of fabric and wrap it around the area quite lightly. You then need to find a long piece of material and wrap it tightly, starting from the fingers, checking every few seconds by pressing one finger until it turns whitish yellow. Then release the pressure and if the finger turns red again you are wrapping it just right. If it stays whitish yellow you need to repeat the wrapping to the end of the arm or limb that has been bitten. Remember to write the time the bite occurred and

what time you completed the bandaging. One piece of information that Megan gave us was that venomous baby snakes are more dangerous than adult snakes because they don't know how much venom to inject. In conclusion, we would like to give a massive thank you to Megan and the St John Ambulance Centre for coming out to Edgewater Primary School to teach the Years Four to Six about snake bites and electric shocks. We enjoyed the incursion and appreciate the certificates. Thank you Megan and St John Ambulance Centre.
