






Visual Art News



Science News

Last term was a busy time for Science. We recognised Science Week and this year's theme 'Species Survival – More then Just Sustainability'.

The Year 4 to 6 students competed in the Belridge Science Challenge and the Pre-Primary to Year 3 students immersed themselves in the Science Tabloids.

The Tabloids covered an array of Science concepts from forces, states of matter, physical changes and adaptations. The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

We were also fortunate to once again have a team of Science medical researchers speak to the Year 6 students.



Lucy, a PhD student specialising in vaccinology, explained what a career in Science and STEM looks like. She spoke about her personal journey and then explained the science behind developing and discovering vaccines to prevent infectious diseases.

The students then completed a hands-on activity, creating their own virus model.









From our Community Health Nurse

Scoliosis

Scoliosis is an abnormal sideways curvature of the spine. It can be detected by a simple examination of the back. The normal spine has three curves — one in the neck, one in the upper back and one in the lower back. These curves can be seen from the side, but when you look from behind the spine should appear straight. If the spine has a sideways curve, this is scoliosis.



Please read through the scoliosis information provided by Raising Children Network and check your child for scoliosis as described.

Colour Blindness

Children who are colour blind can see as clearly as other people but can't tell the difference between some colours or see colours differently from other people. Very few people who are colour blind are 'blind' to all colours – most often they see red and green as very similar.

It's good to know if a child is colour blind because they may have difficulty at school with activities that use colours, such as drawing and sorting blocks, and with computers. Please read through information on colour blindness provided by Raising Children Network.

If you have any concerns, colour vision testing can be performed by some General Practitioners (GP), eye specialists or optometrists.

Undescended testes

Screening for undescended testes is recommended for boys at school entry (~4-5 years of age). Around 2-4% of boys have an undescended testes at birth. Sometimes the testes (also known as testicle) is in the scrotum at birth but is pulled up into the groin or abdomen at around 4-10 years of age. This happens because the cord that attaches the testicle to the abdomen doesn't grow at the same rate as the child.

Undescended testes don't fully sit within the scrotum. The condition isn't painful but can increase the risk of several other health issues such as decreased fertility and testicular cancer. For those boys who develop an undescended testicle later in childhood, the 'ascending' testicle often needs surgery between 5 years and 10 years.

Please read through the information about undescended testicles provided by Raising Children Network and encourage your child to check themselves as described there.





School Health Services

Health information for parents and carers of upper primary children



Your child will soon be a teenager, so now's a good time to think about some important health issues.



School health services

School health nurses provide a school health service through primary and secondary schools. If you have any concerns about your child's health, contact the school health nurse through your school office.

Other people who may be able to help are the school psychologist, your child's teacher, your doctor, or your local child development centre – see healthywa.wa.gov.au/childdevelopment

Healthy lifestyle

- Encourage children to keep physically active, choose healthy food, and get sufficient sleep.
- Eat dinner as a family to promote good communication and connection.
- Your child should have a dental health check every year. Contact the school dental health service or a private dentist.

Good mental health

Good communication with your child is always the best way to promote mental and emotional health. If you have any concerns about your child, talk to your doctor, community school health nurse or school psychologist. Find out more at raisingchildren.net.au

Immunisations

With your consent, your child will be offered immunisation against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and human papillomavirus (HPV) in Year 7, and meningococcal (types A, C, W and Y) in Year 10. Find out more at healthywa.wa.gov.au/immunisation

Puberty

Now is a good time to discuss physical and emotional changes with your child. We recommend Talk soon. Talk often. A guide for parents talking to their kids about sex, available from

healthywa.wa.gov.au/Talk-soon-Talk-often
Schools usually teach students about growth and
development during Years 5 and 6. Your child's
teacher can give you more information about these
classes.

Scoliosis

This is an abnormal, sideways curvature of the spine. It can develop during early adolescence, usually between 10 and 13 years. Your school will give your child information about checking for scoliosis in Year 6. If you have any concerns, talk to your doctor or community school health nurse. Find out more at raisingchildren.net.au

Vision

Take your child to your doctor* or an optometrist* if your child:

- covers or closes one eye when reading
- holds books very close
- complains about eyestrain or headache
- complains about double vision or blurred vision with reading or blackboard viewing
- complains that words move on a page
- loses place with reading, or skips words and lines
- has a short attention span when reading
- rubs their eyes a lot.
- *Check with your doctor/optometrist about bulk billing.

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Whooping cough (pertussis)

- > Whooping cough is a highly infectious disease that can be life threatening for babies and young children.
- > It usually starts with cold-like symptoms and a cough that worsens into uncontrollable coughing.
- > Vaccination is the best way to prevent whooping cough.

Whooping cough is a potentially fatal bacterial infection that attacks the airways causing uncontrollable coughing and difficulty breathing.

Young infants infected with whooping cough may stop breathing or turn blue, have apnoea (pauses in normal breathing), pneumonia, feeding problems and weight loss, seizures, brain damage and, in some cases, even die.

Older children and adults can also become infected with whooping cough and, while their symptoms are usually less severe, they can pass the infection to others, including infants too young to be immunised.

What are the signs and symptoms of whooping cough?

Symptoms generally appear 7 to 10 days after infection.

Whooping cough usually starts like a cold with a blocked or runny nose, tiredness, mild fever and cough.

The cough typically gets worse and severe bouts of uncontrollable coughing can develop.

Coughing bouts can be followed by vomiting, choking or taking a big gasping breath which causes a 'whooping' sound. The cough can last for many weeks and can be worse at night.

Some newborns may not cough at all but they can stop breathing and turn blue. Some babies have difficulty feeding and can choke or gag, they may have apnoea (pauses in normal breathing), pneumonia, weight loss, seizures, brain damage and, in some cases, can even die.

Older children and adults may just have a cough that lasts for many weeks.

Not every person makes the whooping sound - this is more common in non-immunised children.

The cough may last up to 3 months, but the person is no longer infectious after 21 days (3 weeks).

Whooping cough was previously referred to as the '100-day cough' as it can persist for months and can be so severe that it could cause vomiting, broken ribs and hospitalisation.

Pneumonia is a relatively common complication, and seizures and brain disease occur rarely.

How is whooping cough spread?

Whooping cough spreads by airborne droplets, that is, an infectious person coughs or sneezes bacteria into the air which can then be inhaled by other people in close proximity

Once a person is infected with whooping cough and starts experiencing symptoms they can be infectious to others unless they are treated early.

Without treatment people with whooping cough are infectious during the first 3 weeks of their illness and can infect others in their household, workplace, child care centre and school.
