Australian Early Development Census (AEDC-carried out every three years)

This week and next the Pre-primary staff will conduct the AEDC.

The AEDC provides information to build and strengthen communities for our children.

It is an Australian-wide census that gathers information about young children's progress at national, state/territory and community levels.

The census gathers information on five key areas of children's development:

- physical health and wellbeing
- social competence
- emotional maturity
- language and cognitive skills
- communication skills and general knowledge

These five areas are considered good predictors of adult health, education and social outcomes.

By understanding how young children are progressing, communities can look at ways to positively influence child development.

As a school we highly value the data that the census provides in supporting the school's improvement agenda. Below is the school's data from the 2018 census.

Australian Early Development Census (School Report 2018)


Below is the percentage of Edgewater pre-primary students who are developmentally on track and are considered to be developing well in the five key domains tested.

- 92% physical health and wellbeing
- 95% social competence
- 97% emotional maturity
- 95% language and cognitive skills (school based)
- 93% communication skills and general knowledge

In 2018, two children of the sixty-one tested were considered to be in the vulnerable range in one or more domains and two children vulnerable in two or more domains. This correlated with school based data and provides the opportunity for early years' staff to review and strengthen existing practices.

Comparison of historical data from 2009 shows the percentage of Edgewater Primary School children considered vulnerable has declined.

United Nations Youth Voice Competition

Ex-Edgewater Primary School student, Aiva, became the 2021 national junior division champion of the United Nations Youth Voice Competition for her speech, prepared in three hours.

As Australia's largest speaking competition, the UN Youth Voice drew thousands of students nationally to compete in a series of rounds by researching, writing and presenting a speech that proposed a solution to a global issue.

Competitors were narrowed down through the rounds to the top five speakers in each state, who competed in the nationals before the final five competed in the grand final on Saturday 17 April.

Competitors were given their topic with three hours to prepare a speech before presenting it to the panel, then answered two questions relating to their speech.

UN Youth WA operations vice-president Edward Elias said Aiva "was a delight" to have in the delegation, and other delegates consistently looked to and leant on her.

Aiva is considering her future career aspirations, including the possibility of going into politics.


