- Make them laugh.


Peace Pole Assembly

Yesterday we unveiled Edgewater's Peace Pole which was very kindly donated by the Rotary Club of Mindarie.

The Peace Pole program which had its beginnings after the Second World War in 1955, was developed by the World Peace Prayer Society Founder, Masahisa Goi. Now, more than 250 000 Peace Poles stand in approximately 200 countries around the globe, symbolizing the common wish for a world at peace.

Peace Poles are marked with the message "May Peace Prevail on Earth", standing in silent vigil for peace not only to create a visual reminder to think, speak, and act in the spirit of peace and harmony, but to build community and school spirit and symbolises our common wish for a World at Peace. At Edgewater that message is written in English, Noongar and Chinese.

We are privileged to be the first school in the City of Joondalup to install a Peace Pole with other schools now interested in doing the same.



From The Canteen








Pyjama Day
