The Living Edge

Community spirit was in full force as the Edgewater locals spent their Sunday morning contributing to the Living Edge project at Edgewater Primary School. The Living Edge project aims to revegetate the school grounds using native flora from the Swan Coastal Plain. This will contribute to the health and wellbeing of children and also provide a habitat for native animals. Despite the poor overnight weather, the sun shone brightly as staff, parents and students got their hands dirty in planting over 400 native saplings and plants. To follow on from this remarkable effort, another 400 plants will be introduced to the area before the end of Term Two, with each class getting an opportunity to be involved in improving the school grounds.





On behalf of Edgewater Primary School, we would like to extend our gratitude to the following corporations for their donations of services and resources throughout the day. To Plantrite, we thank you for awarding us a community grant for all of the native shrubs and trees. We would like to thank Bunnings for donating the native plant fertiliser and water saving crystals, which will undoubtedly help these plants to survive and grow.

We are also very thankful for the Friends of Yellagonga Regional Park (Inc) for their assistance in planting and overseeing the project throughout the day.





Next, to all parents, children and community members who assisted on the day – without your help a project like this could never succeed. Lastly, a big thank you to Mr Watkins and Mr Anderson, along with with Mrs Sherwin and Mrs Greentree for guiding teams on correct planting procedures.

From The Canteen

The Canteen strives to take care of our EPS students by serving healthy meals and snacks, but lately we've noticed that the plastic packaging and cutlery we're using for the meals are not healthy for our environment. Sustainability has become the buzz word in the Canteen and we are making great efforts to recycle soft plastics, containers and cardboard boxes whenever we can. Fruit and vegetable scraps are being composted for use in the school's kitchen garden and we are no longer including straws with drink orders. However, we were still supplying plastic cutlery with our tray meals, so we have recently made the switch to biodegradable cutlery. We all need to take responsibility for taking better care of our world for our children, so we're asking for your assistance in



our quest for sustainability. We're giving out between 2 to 5 spoons a day to students who have brought a yoghurt or fruit cup from home, but Mum has forgotten to send a spoon. This practice is neither good for the environment nor the Canteen's profits. Please also consider supplying cutlery from home and metal straws for your children if they're going to purchase meals and drinks from the Canteen. Small changes can make a big difference.
